# HIGHLIGHTS, PROJECTS, AND WINS

# **The Greater Des Moines Partnership**

- The Greater Des Moines Partnership and regional partners have unveiled Broadband User Dashboard Maps based on data and research from the Central lowa Broadband Internet Study. The maps were created as a part of a long-term goal to create a framework under which governments, the public and providers can align in new and innovative ways to create solutions to the digital divide present in Greater Des Moines (DSM). The Broadband User Dashboard Maps outline a path where technology would be best matched to the varying demographics of the region to create the most cost-efficient and highest impact solutions in each area across the region. Each map highlights a key component of the overall deployment process outlining demographics, technology plans, infrastructure deployment costs and site assessment.
- The Greater Des Moines Partnership and Clay & Milk are partnering to develop the lowa Innovation Dashboard, a comprehensive indicator of entrepreneurial activity in the state of lowa. The dashboard will compile several key metrics of entrepreneurial information into one location to capture the pulse of lowa's entrepreneurial and startup climate. The dashboard will track several different metrics including startup growth, external funding, success of accelerator programs, patents filed, team diversity, perceptions of lowa's startup community, and more. The Partnership and Clay & Milk will update the dashboard annually, with plans to add new metrics in future years.
- The Greater Des Moines Partnership announced the winners of the 2021 Economic Impact Awards. The Economic Impact Awards recognize Greater Des Moines companies that have had a significant influence on the local economy in terms of job creation, capital investment and facility expansion. # **CAPITAL CORE**

The urban core of Central lowa will continue to enhance its role as the region's principal activity, hospitality, and employment hub and benefit from safe, dynamic, desirable and affordable neighborhoods.

# HIGHLIGHTS, PROJECTS, AND WINS Principal

- Principal had a soft launch of a learning center situated in the atrium of their building at 711 High Street. They plan to formalize the center and are working on obtaining feedback and input from community organizations to prepare for a full launch in Fall 2022.
- Principal is working with the Greater Des Moines Partnership to bring a golf-themed event to downtown in May 2022 in advance of the Principal Charity Classic in June 2022.

# **City of Des Moines**

- Federal COVID recovery and infrastructure funds continue to be a significant focus some of this work includes:
  - The City has allocated more than \$14.6 million in federal funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development to housing assistance programs in response to the pandemic, including programs that address utility payments, homelessness, eviction prevention, rental assistance, and mortgage assistance. More than 80% of those funds have been expended and the DSM community has been nationally recognized for effectively getting funds to those in need.
  - Through a combination of federal and local funding, the City has allocated another \$6.6 million to programs for food assistance, small business recovery, mental health, and childcare. Recent activities include funding the DMARC mobile food pantry, mental health services to address the stress of the pandemic, internet service for students to access school remotely, and scholarships for children to attend programming outside of school.
  - Federal funding sources include Community Development Block Grant (CDBG-CV), Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG-CV), and the US Department of Treasury. In addition, the City will be looking to allocate \$3.5 million of HOME Investment Partnerships Program from the American Rescue Plan (HOME-ARP) in the upcoming year to assist with projects that help house those who are homeless or at-risk of becoming homeless.

# Krause+ and the City of Des Moines

- Demolition and remediation continues at the former DICO site. The City and EPA have worked to demolish all vertical structures over the past several months. Ongoing work to remediate the site will continue through 2022. Design continues for a soccer stadium on the site.
- Pro lowa announced that a United Soccer League expansion soccer team has been secured for the community.
- The ISDF, the fundraising arm of the Pro Iowa Initiative, has completed 87% of its \$25 million fundraising goal.
- The City of Des Moines will submit the final application to the State's Iowa Reinvestment Act funding program later this month, with a request to secure over \$20M in state funding through rebates of state sales and hotel/motel taxes.
- Once constructed, Des Moines' USL Championship club will be poised for the first kick in 2024.

# **Downtown DSM: Future Forward**

- The Greater Des Moines Partnership, in collaboration with Bravo Greater Des Moines, Catch Des Moines, City of Des Moines, Des Moines Regional Transit Authority (DART), Des Moines Downtown Chamber of Commerce, Des Moines Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO), FuseDSM, Operation Downtown and Polk County, are working to develop Downtown DSM: Future Forward, a community-driven Downtown vision plan and action plan, to help position Downtown Des Moines (DSM) for short-term economic recovery and long-term economic vitality and vibrancy. The vision plan creates a roadmap for the next chapter of Downtown and helps the region build upon the excitement that already exists in Downtown through events, attractions, major projects, major employers and more. Downtown DSM: Future Forward will also roll up into the Capital Crossroads regional vision plan, which will be updated in 2022.
- The Downtown DSM: Future Forward Steering Committee is working extensively with a consulting team made up of local, regional and national experts who have international downtown experience as well. The team consists of Bâton Global, Civitas Consultants and RDG Planning & Design. As part of the process, the plan's leaders and consultants are engaging the public to garner feedback and ideas for the future of Downtown DSM. Over 2,000 people have participated in the plan through the online platform, focus groups, open houses, and other avenues.
- A draft of the plan will be available for public feedback this spring.

# **OPPORTUNITIES & CHALLENGES**

Return to office efforts still remains uncertain for many large downtown employers. As of now, office vacancy rates are over 20% and are projected to approach or exceed 30%. This has a significant impact on downtown businesses and future planning.

# **EQUITY & INCLUSION**

- Equity and inclusion is a primary focus for the Future Forward Council which was appointed by the Steering Committee of the Downtown DSM: Future Forward plan. The Future Forward Council is made up of more than 40 leaders representing organizations from throughout Greater Des Moines. The Future Forward Council is designed to give input and drive ideas for the planning process for the future of Downtown DSM. The Council includes a diverse array of representatives from community organizations to ensure people of many different backgrounds and interests have an opportunity to cultivate a growing and thriving Downtown that is inclusive and welcoming to everyone. The Future Forward Council Leaders are Teree Caldwell-Johnson, President and CEO of Oakridge Neighborhood; Jen Carruthers, President of Capital City Pride; and Mary Sellers, President of United Way of Central Iowa. All who will also serve as liaisons for the council on the Future Forward Steering Committee.
- Principal is developing programs on or near their campus that provide opportunities for Des Moines youth, from all over the city, to experience downtown and corporate environments.

# **HIGHLIGHTS, PROJECTS, AND WINS**

- Six companies completed the second cohort of the Cultivo Virtual Academy in November, wrapping
  up a six-week program of facilitated discussions with Iowa business, research and farmer leaders,
  as well as networking opportunities in targeted areas. Three of the six businesses have signed
  affiliate agreements with Iowa State University Research Park.
- Cultivation Corridor welcomed Hy-Vee and Scoular as stakeholders and investors. Investors and
  partners of the Corridor are working together to accelerate the development of new technologies,
  strengthen lowa's ag bioscience workforce, and attract economic development, all focused on
  meeting the challenge of feeding a growing world population in a sustainable way.
- Overall momentum in the food and agriculture industry in lowa is strong.

# HIGHLIGHTS, PROJECTS, AND WINS

### **Catch Des Moines**

- Catch Des Moines released the new 2022 Catch Des Moines Visitors Guide! They made a
  concerted effort to create a guide that was not only informative, but also engaging, entertaining,
  and representative of the communities, people and different scenes that make DSM unique. For
  the first time, the intro to each section contains a feature on a local representative of that scene.
  For example, highlighting Mike Vallely on the cover, Nick Tillinghast of Des Moines Does Things in
  the Restaurants & Nightlife section, Tobi Parks from xBk for our Arts & Culture, and Sid Juwarker
  of TeeHee's for Things to Do. The Guide is available at hotels and newsstands throughout the

- Catch Des Moines launched new videos in our 'Des Best' series featuring the state sandwich of lowa, the breaded pork tenderloin, and one that highlights Greater Des Moines' buzzy cocktail scene!
- Catch Des Moines launched a successful month of a co-op TikTok campaign with the Science Center of Iowa and crossed the 3,500 follower mark on TikTok, which is higher than most of our Midwest counterparts.
- Catch Des Moines' weekly e-newsletters had the highest open rate percentages of the year in December
- Their 2021 Local Gift Guide was featured in <u>Newsbreak</u> and had more than 9.2 million impressions.

### **Bravo**

- Bravo continues to run grantmaking programs that are putting money into the cultural organizations that make our community vibrant.
- Bravo also returned to an in-person Gala this year to highlight Bravo's role on advancing the cultural sector. We have begun working on a strategic plan that will inform the organization's focus for the next 3-5 years and shape the future we want to see in 15-20 years.



# Bravo

The cultural sector continues to struggle as the pandemic lingers. Audiences are
returning but not entirely and revenues are severely depleted. The labor shortage is real for the
sector and the transition to hybrid continues to strain operations. Although Q1FY22 Hotel/Motel
Tax revenues were almost back to pre-pandemic levels, it is difficult to project how long it will take
to annualize return to full investment levels.

# **EQUITY & INCLUSION**

### Bravo

Bravo continues to work with cultural partners on ways to advance equity and cultural competency.
 We are currently working with leaders of the lowa Juneteenth Celebration to create a regional strategy to lift-up the holiday with complimentary programming.

# **Catch Des Moines**

Their Diversity Equity and Inclusion Committee met for the first time this quarter. This committee is
designed as a strategic think tank in which members collaborate and advise on efforts to promote
Greater Des Moines as an ethnically diverse visitor destination. The committee will share insights,
and make recommendations to assist Catch Des Moines in attracting and welcoming diverse
groups to the city.

# **NEWS & EVENTS**

# **Catch Des Monies**

- On January 24, Catch Des Moines announced that the Red Bull Soapbox Race will be coming to Des Moines on Saturday, June 18. Since the first race in Brussels in 2000, more than 100 Red Bull Soapbox events have been held in places like Los Angeles, Hong Kong, and Sydney, Australia. This is the first time the event has come to lowa.
  - The Red Bull Soapbox Race is a race competition in which amateur teams see who can navigate their homemade cart the fastest through a downhill course, filled with obstacles and potential crashes, in front of a crowd of tens-of-thousands.
  - Applying to participate in Red Bull Soapbox Iowa is free, but applicants must be 18 years or older to enter.
  - Red Bull Soapbox Race Iowa's course will run the length of East Walnut Street, alongside the State Capitol Complex, from E 12th Street to E 7th Street. Viewing is free and open to the public.

# **GOVERNANCE CAPITAL**

Central lowa governments will sustain partnerships to optimize process coordination and regional governance.

# HIGHLIGHTS, PROJECTS, AND WINS

- The cities of Des Moines and Urbandale finalized an application to Iowa Economic Development Authority for a \$26.5 million allocation from the Iowa Reinvestment Act regarding reinvestment in the Merle Hay campus in Urbandale and Des Moines. Almost \$140 million are planned to be invested in the 75-acre area.
- Urbandale and Grimes renewed annexation agreements to help guide orderly community growth for both cities in the decades ahead.
- The City of Urbandale is currently working with a consultant to develop a new Comprehensive Plan. The plan will not only look at the development of the area within the current and future city limits but will also study three sub-areas: 1) Downtown Urbandale; 2) the Douglas Avenue Corridor from eastern to western city limits; and 3) the Northpark and Plum Drive corridors.
- Worldwide Logistics announced a new office facility in Urbandale. A spring 2022 construction start is planned.
- The executive committee for the Central Iowa Code Consortium announced that fourteen metro area communities have signed the memorandum of understanding which recognizes the Central Iowa Code Consortium (CICC). The CICC is a collaborative effort to improve consistency in the adoption and enforcement of construction codes in the many communities that make up our metro area. This idea was first brought forth through the Capital Crossroads planning effort as one of the five pilot projects looking into the possibilities of local government collaboration. The CICC has successfully guided the metro through the 2015 and 2018 code adoption processes. The Executive Committee is busy working through the schedule for the 2021 process.
- Des Moines, Clive, Pleasant Hill, and Urbandale have passed the regional stormwater ordinances created by Capital Crossroads. Several other cities are planning to adopt these ordinances this spring.

# **EQUITY & INCLUSION**

 Urbandale has expanded employee recruitment efforts to better reach communities of color by utilizing the 4 Equity Tool.

• Several communities are having public feedback opportunities for the use of American Rescue Plan Act funding.

# **COLLABORATION**

- Governance Capital continues to collaborate with Natural Capital and city governments to promote the passage of the regional stormwater ordinances.
- Governance Capital is exploring potential collaborations with Social Capital on the topic of civility in local governments.
- Capital Crossroads also seeks opportunities to identify areas of regional collaboration for investing federal COVID-19 relief funds.

# HIGHLIGHTS, PROJECTS, AND WINS

# **United Way of Central Iowa**

- A collaboration of Central Iowa Healthcare industry partners, led by Central Iowa Works
  Healthworks program, are supporting a large-scale grant application to the U.S. Economic
  Development Authority/Department of Commerce who issued a Good Jobs Challenge opportunity
  as part of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). The two primary goals of this effort are to
  support employers to attract and retain diverse individuals to fill the much-needed positions in
  central Iowa's healthcare sector. The second goal is to help individuals who face systemic barriers
  to employment overcome those obstacles and use their skills to earn a livable wage.
- A diverse healthcare workforce leads to better health outcomes and a stronger local economy. Like other parts of the country, Central lowa is experiencing racial disparities in health outcomes and shortages of healthcare workers. This effort would build upon the HealthWorks program framework which, over the past 4 years, has been successful in training and placing nearly 800 diverse individuals in high-demand, high-quality healthcare careers. 78% of participants were Black/African American, 26% White, 8% Asian, 5% Latinx, 4% more than one race, and 2% Native American.

# **Greater Des Moines Partnership**

 The Greater Des Moines Partnership hosted the 9th Annual Inclusion Summit on November 10, 2021.

- Additionally, The Partnership team hosted another Career DSM Launch webinar in partnership with Tallo. The event covered healthcare, and educational institutions Des Moines University and Mercy One were highlighted. The event also highlighted healthcare employers Broadlawns Medical Center and UnityPoint.
- The first Multicultural Reception was on Martin Luther King day on Monday, January 17, 2022 in partnership with the City of West Des Moines, Des Moines University, West Des Moines Human Rights Commission, and the West Des Moines Chamber.
- The Partnership hosted its first Future Ready DSM talent webinar on January 26, 2022. The
  webinar highlighted internships for college students and programs for college graduates. The event
  included a panel discussion with representatives from Principal Financial, Bankers Trust,
  Merchants Bonding, and the Greater Des Moines Partnership.
- Additionally, the Partnership launched the two part workshop "Awake to Woke to Work: Building a Race Equity Culture" on Wednesday, February 9, 2022.

The pandemic has presented a significant number of hurdles as it relates to human capital –
including extended unemployment, the inability of companies to recruit and retain the number of
employees needed to meet their business needs, and continued systemic barriers that prevent
Central lowans from thriving like affordable/safe/stable housing, food insecurity, unsustainable
wages, etc. Community partners are continuing to evaluate the current environment and define
strategies that will address both supply and demand barriers.

# **EQUITY & INCLUSION**

- Human Capital remains focused on Equity and Inclusion through our work to create a more diverse healthcare workforce.
- The Greater Des Moines Partnership has continued to host its own internal DEI trainings.
   Additionally, the Inclusion Council had a retreat in December to debrief for the year and plan for 2022.

# HIGHLIGHTS, PROJECTS, AND WINS

- ICON received an award of \$15 million from the State's Water Infrastructure Fund. This aid will be
  the catalyst to constructing the Fleur Drive site, the second of the three downtown Des Moines dam
  mitigation projects.
- Currently, ICON is completing the bid process for the BUILD Grant phase of the project, which included the project sites of Prospect Park, Birdland Marina, Scott Avenue and Harriet Street.
- ICON is shifting focus from the design of Scott Avenue to kicking off the design at Fleur Drive and Center Street.
- The team is working to establish the new ICON Water Trails non-profit organization following the split from Great Outdoors Foundation. This includes evolving into a regional entity and identifying the organization's strategic goals

# **OPPORTUNITIES & CHALLENGES**

Right now, ICON's main focus is getting the regional entity established and running. They are
working through the transition from CIWT to ICON both administratively and operationally, as well
as the evolution to the new format of the Board with 70% public representation, 30% private. In
addition to setting up the new organization, they are also maintaining project management of their
downtown projects. All of this is due to the tremendous support and momentum of the project and
being able to continue that while also creating the long-term sustainability and identity of the ICON
organization.

# **EQUITY & INCLUSION**

As ICON worked through establishing their new
ICON Board, they were intentional about bringing on new and diverse
voices to the table. There was a bit of a struggle with a balance in keeping a sense of continuity
with some of those key stakeholders and champions who have been involved since the beginning
and bringing in those new players. There is certainly a specific need with some of those original
stakeholders for the time being, but they have it on their radar to start folding in those new voices
and the project continues to mature.

# **NEWS & EVENTS**

ICON will be seeking significant public and stakeholder input as they move into their next phase of
design for the downtown projects. They will be looking for participation from several local partners
and community members to help influence and determine the future design. Organizations include
Botanical Gardens, Pro lowa, Can Play, DEI, etc. They are always looking for ways to collaborate
with other organizations, specifically those that play a role on the riverfront. They want to ensure
they are creating efficiencies with what is already in the works or what is looking to be
accomplished.

# HIGHLIGHTS, PROJECTS, AND WINS

# **MPO**

- Transload Facility construction has been completed and they have started having shipments going through the facility
- An Economic Development District has been created. The Mid-lowa Planning Alliance for Community Development (MIPA) will cover Polk, Warren, Dallas, Story, Boone, Jasper, and Marion counties, and will allow for the region to apply for competitive, regional grants and pool resources together for collaboration.
- The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs act was passed. MPO is waiting for further guidance on the law.

# • Des Moines Area Regional Transit Authority

(DART)A final draft of the Transit Optimization Study was shared with the Commission in February for review and feedback prior to adopting the final study in March. The process for the study included three workshops with the Commission, two rounds of public outreach including 50 virtual and in-person public meetings and events, and the collection of more than 2,000 survey responses and stakeholder interactions. The Commission's recommendations for near-term and future service changes for enhanced mobility are detailed in the upcoming report. Included in the recommendations for this year is a microtransit on-demand service in West Des Moines similar to the one that recently launched in Ankeny in November called DART on Demand, and has seen a significant increase in ridership from the On Call service it replaced.

 DART staff have presented a proposed FY 2023 budget to the DART Commission and a public meeting will be held on March 1 for feedback. DART presented the proposed budget to the Commission during a workshop in late January, and staff also met with DART's 12-member government city managers on January 31. In addition to budget work, DART staff have been compiling extensive information as part of the Federal Transit Administration's (FTA) Triennial Review.

# Here We Grow: Workforce Housing

- The Workforce Housing Committee has met with the cities of Altoona, Ankeny, Bondurant, Clive,
   Des Moines, Grimes, Johnston, Norwalk, Urbandale, Pleasant Hill, Waukee, and West Des Moines to discuss workforce housing and opportunities for collaboration.
- Now that the initial community meetings have concluded, the Committee will be focusing efforts on
  planning roundtable meetings and creating tools that communities can use to increase the
  availability of workforce housing in the region.

# **OPPORTUNITIES & CHALLENGES**

# **Des Moines Area Regional Transit Authority (DART)**

- In response to COVID-19 cases among its workforce, DART removed select trips from Local Route 52 and six of its Express Routes in late January. The trips were removed to adjust DART's service levels to match its available workforce. DART is trying to keep buses running on all routes at the scheduled times, but this has been difficult as bus operators are temporarily out of work because of the significant community spread of COVID-19. DART will restore service to these trips when staffing levels improve.
- Like many other organizations, DART is experiencing challenges due to supply chain disruptions. A
  variety of supplies from parts for bus repairs to print passes to vans and buses are either on

backorder or the time-to-fill orders are greatly extended. Despite the challenges, DART is moving forward with some purchases including the purchase from Tolar Manufacturing of approximately 26 bus shelters, most of which will include colored art glass, and 20 benches for bus stops. DART Commissioners also recently approved the purchase of seven light-duty buses that will be used to support DART's Paratransit, microtransit and shuttle services. The buses are smaller than the buses DART currently uses for these services and is part of an ongoing effort by the DART Commission and staff to right size its fleet.

# **Polk County Housing Trust Fund (PCHTF)**

Many communities are working through their use of American Rescue Plan Act funds and PCHTF
is making an extra effort to monitor and provide support where possible if communities express an
interest on working on housing with those funds.

# **Des Moines Area Regional Transit Authority (DART)**

- DART is regularly considering equity impacts in how they plan and deliver public transit service in Greater Des Moines. Recently, they used the 4 Equity tool to help guide their public outreach plans as they gathered public feedback on near- and long-term service proposals that will serve as a roadmap for DART Commission and staff as they plan for the future.
- During this quarter, DART staff continued planning work through its Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Committee. In addition, DART staff began planning the celebration of Rosa Parks Day. To commemorate this day, DART reserved one seat on each fixed route bus in service on Feb. 4 to Mrs. Parks. A sign was tied to the first forward-facing seat on each bus and it shared a little bit about her legacy and impact in de-segregating public transportation during the Civil Rights Movement. DART also created a webpage to further celebrate Mrs. Parks and her legacy.
- DART DEI Committee Co-Chair Georisha McGregor says as 2022 gets underway: "It is our commitment to keep our DEI goals at the forefront. We've had a great start to the year encouraging and creating awareness surrounding Black History, and we also understand there's a deeper need in our communities, because of this we have recently reviewed our DART & DEI Community Events to ensure we are intentional about our representation."

# **Polk County Housing Trust Fund**

Equity and Inclusion is the third guiding principle for the Regional Housing Strategy. This has been
instrumental to PCHTF's work with Here We Grow. Additionally, PCHTF set several DEI goals in
their strategic plan that was approved this month; in addition, they are doing a month of outreach
on social media related to the redlining project.

# **Des Moines Area Regional Transit Authority (DART)**

- DART has several things to watch for this spring:
  - Several more art bus shelters will be installed see the video about one of the projects here.
  - DART will be collecting feedback on its Express Routes in February and March as it works to better align trip times and the number of trips to the demand.
  - This spring, DART will be collecting feedback on several proposed changes to service in West Des Moines that were identified as part of the Transit Optimization Study.

# **Des Moines Area Regional Transit Authority (DART)**

- Funding diversification will continue to be a focus for DART with a proposal for a transit hotel/motel tax that gained traction last year in the Legislature and will hopefully move forward during the 2022 session and through a voter referendum next fall with the help of many community partners.
- DART continues to work closely with BRAVO Greater Des Moines, public art stakeholders, artists, and member governments on the planning and installation of art bus shelters throughout the region.
- Staff has been conducting outreach to organizations who work with individuals who qualify for our half-fare pilot program, particularly as it relates to housing assistance, food assistance, or workforce and job training programs.
- DART will work closely with local school systems as they contemplate changes in the school calendar.

# **Polk County Housing Trust Fund**

- PCHTF continues to collaborate with Capital Crossroads and United Way on the Here We Grow effort and with the Iowa Finance Authority on the #WelcomeHomeIowa campaign.
- So far Project Iowa, the Des Moines Police Department and several other organizations are helping PCHTF plan their annual Landlord Forum.
- PCHTF is excited to be working on a plan to help HOME, Inc., tell the story of an accessory
  housing unit they are building in the Highland Park neighborhood.
